II. **VENUE:** Bangag Marine Sanctuary, Saavedra Moalboal Cebu.

III. **MISSION**

To support coastal environmental protection and community welfare through the conduct of cleanup operations and hygiene initiatives, in alignment with the Philippine Coast Guard Auxiliary's functions on Marine Environmental Protection (MAREP) and Maritime Community Relations (MCOMREL), by mobilizing auxiliary personnel to reduce marine pollution, promote environmental awareness, and strengthen partnerships with local government units, educational institutions, and coastal communities. Likewise, to ensure the proper upkeep and maintenance of the Coastal Outpost in order to provide a safe and conducive facility for patrolling officers and maritime personnel.

IV. CHRONOLOGICAL EVENTS

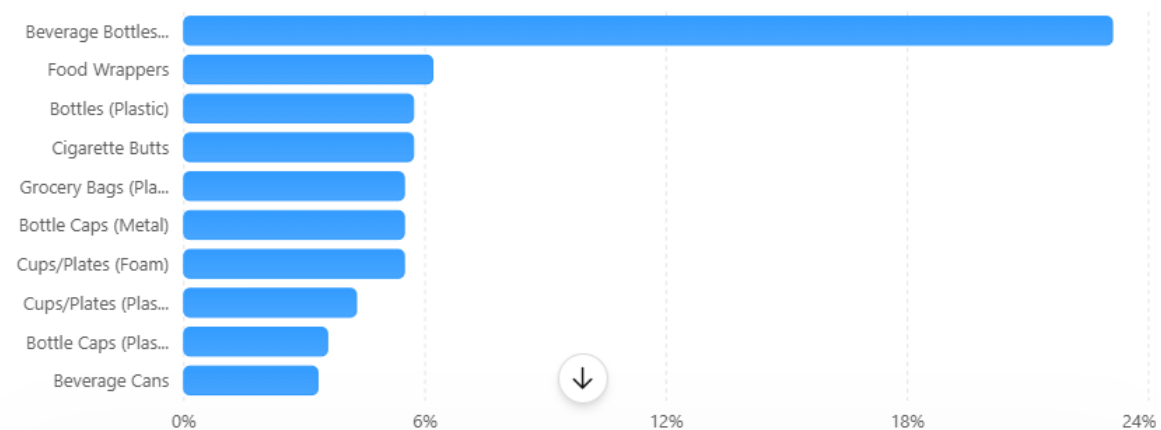
On May 27, 2026, members of the 202.3 CGAS actively participated in and supported Cleanup Drive and Repainting of the Coastal Outpost conducted at Bangag Marine Sanctuary Saavedra Moalboal Cebu.

The cleanup drive, participated by the squadrons demonstrated strong LGU collaboration contributing to the collection and segregation of waste materials within the designated coastal area. The members were able to collect a total of 420 items weighing approximately 140.28kg of trashes. The data below presents a ranked list of the items collected during the cleanup:

Top Coastal Cleanup Waste Items

Percentage share of the most commonly collected waste items during the coastal cleanup activity.



The cleanup data shows that glass beverage bottles were by far the most dominant waste collected, accounting for more than 23% of all recorded debris. Single-use consumer waste such as food wrappers, plastic bottles, cigarette butts, grocery bags, bottle caps, and disposable food containers collectively formed the majority of coastal pollution. The presence of construction materials, tires, diapers, and fishing-related debris further indicates both land-based dumping and marine-related pollution sources affecting the coastal environment.

Subsequently, 202.3 CGAS conducted the repainting of the Coastal Outpost and donation of industrial standard garbage bins to preserve and beautify the area. This initiative aimed to enhance maritime safety and improve the welfare and working environment of patrolling personnel in the area, while complementing the environmental objectives of the cleanup drive. All materials and fundings were with the support of other 202nd members who were not able to attend the said event but participated thru their treasures and talents.
